Dear Family,

On behalf of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Parish, I wish to express my deepest sympathy on the death of your loved one. Together we pray for you and your family members that the Lord Jesus will bless and comfort you during this time of loss and grief.

Our parish community will be represented by our Bereavement Ministry, a trained group of lay parishioners, who can assist you in the planning of the Mass of Christian Burial. These services offer a hopeful message that death is not the end of life, but rather the beginning of a new life with Our Risen Savior. It does so through hymns and readings, through prayers and blessings, and, of course, the Eucharist.

Once you have confirmed the date and time of the Funeral Mass with the mortuary or our parish office, a Bereavement Minister will contact you to make an appointment to plan the Mass with your choice of scripture readings, hymns and prayers. Please refer to the materials in this booklet for ways in which the Bereavement Ministers can support you, and for the choices you'll be making for Scripture readings and hymns.

All the information needed from you is to be written on the 'Mass Information Form' at the back of this booklet. This form, when completed, will be our guideline for the Funeral Mass.

After the Mass of Christian Burial has been planned, I meet with the family to get a sense of the person who has passed to see how he or she had a relationship with our Blessed Lord and expressed it by loving their neighbor.

We look forward to serving you. It is our hope that the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel community can extend spiritual comfort, prayerful support, and hospitality.

May the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen

PLANNING CHECKLIST FOR FUNERAL MASS AND RECEPTION

1. Call the Parish Office 659-2224 and do the following:

Arrange for a Mass date, time and Celebrant.

Arrange for a reception in the Parish Hall, if desired (maximum capacity is 150).

2. Read the *Planning Booklet for Funeral Mass and Reception (Planning Booklet)*.

Read the Catholic teaching regarding the care of remains.

Choose the Scripture Readings (see pages 6-18 of this booklet).

Decide if your friends or family will take a role in the Mass.

Select the hymns (see page 19 in this booklet).

Decide if there will be "Words of Remembrance" and who will give them (see page 20 of this booklet).

Contact the people you have chosen to serve at the Mass.

3. Fill out the *Funeral Mass Information Form* (located in the back pocket of this booklet).

The Bereavement Minister and Celebrant will need this information to plan the Mass. The Bereavement Ministers will be available to assist you in answering questions and completing the form.

4. Attend the scheduled planning meeting that has been arranged by the Bereavement Ministers.

Bring the **Planning Booklet** including the **Mass Information Form** you have filled out.

CATHOLIC TEACHINGS ON THE CARE OF REMAINS

The Catholic Church teaches that the soul is immortal and does not depend on the state of the physical body. According to the current Church teaching, since cremation of the deceased's remains does not affect the soul, there are no doctrinal objections to the practice of cremation.

Cremated remains (cremains) should be kept in a "sacred place" such as a church cemetery. Just as the body of the deceased is handled with respect and reverenced at the funeral and lovingly buried afterward, so should the cremated remains of the deceased receive similar respect. Ashes should not be scattered at sea, kept in urns at home, nor should they be divided up between family members, preserved in mementos, or pieces of jewelry.

Also of important consideration is the creation of a sacred place, which is a final resting place for the body (or its cremains). Here the person's name is remembered and the time he/she lived, and can be visited by not only family and friends, but by future generations for years to come.

OPTIONS FOR FUNERAL SERVICES

There are several ways to hold a service to honor a loved one after death:

Mass of Resurrection (With the body or cremains present)

Memorial Mass or Service (No remains are present)

Graveside Service – The Priest goes to burial site and prays with family as the casket or cremains are interred.

SERVICES PROVIDED BY OLMC BEREAVEMENT MINISTRY

Funeral Planning – A Bereavement Minister will meet with the family to arrange and plan the Funeral Mass. Scripture readings and hymns will be chosen. The Celebrant may attend the meeting as well.

Mass Service – Bereavement Ministers serve as Greeters and Ushers, and they may distribute Mass programs. Family and friends of the deceased are encouraged to participate in various ways including serving as Readers and Bearers of the Gifts of Bread and Wine. Bereavement Ministers will instruct and assist them with all the details of performing these functions. Should the family/friends choose not to do these functions, Bereavement Ministers will fill these roles. They can also assist with the guest book, reserve pews for family members and help with special touches such as setting up a candle and photo of your loved one if desired. Should "Words of Remembrance" presentation (eulogy) be desired, it can be given after Communion at the Funeral Mass. The Bereavement Ministers will instruct the speaker about the procedure for the short presentation. (5 minutes) (See page 20 for guidance.) Another option is the "Words of Remembrance" may be given at the reception where there is no limit on time or speakers.

Bereavement Support – A JOURNEY of GRIEF HANDBOOK will be given to the family. If desired, Bereavement Ministers will call or visit to offer support to the family in the months following the funeral. Masses may be offered and cards may be sent on special days and anniversaries.

If you need help or have questions, we will be available to assist you when we meet at the Parish Office.

Indeed, no price is worthy of her temperate soul.

Like the sun rising in the Lord's heavens, the beauty of a virtuous wife is the radiance of her home.

Second Readings: Numbers 14 through 21 – New Testament Select One

14. Romans 6:3-4, 8-9 (We too might live in newness of life.)

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters: Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

The Word of the Lord.

15.2 Timothy 4:6-8 (I have kept the faith.)

A reading from the second letter of St. Paul to Timothy.

I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith;
In the future there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day; and not only to me,

but also to all who have loved His appearing.

The Word of the Lord.

16. Romans 8:31b-35, 37-39 (Nothing will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ.)

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters: If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us. Who will condemn? It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword? No, in all these things, we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

17.2 Corinthians 4:14-18, 5:1 (What is seen is transitory and what is unseen is eternal.)

A reading from the second letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians.

Brothers and sisters: We know that the One who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence. Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God. Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal. For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

The Word of the Lord.

18. Philippians 3:20-21 (He will change our lowly bodies to conform to his Glory.)

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Philippians.

Brothers and sisters; Our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we also await a savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified Body by the power that enables him also to bring all things into subjection to himself.

The Word of the Lord.

19.1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 (We shall stay with the Lord forever.)

A reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians.

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep. Indeed, we tell you this, on the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will surely not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord, himself, with a word of command, with the voice of an archangel and with the trumpet of God, will come down from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. Thus we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore, console one another with these words.

Second Readings: Numbers 14 through 21 (continued)

20. The First Letter of John: 3:1-2 (We shall see God as God really is.)

A reading from the First Letter of St. John.

Beloved: See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. Yet so we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we shall be has not yet been revealed. We do know that when it is revealed we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. *The Word of the Lord*.

21.1 Corinthians: 13:3-8 (Faith, hope, and love abide; but the greatest of these is love.)

A reading from St. Paul to the Corinthians.

Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; It is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; It is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth.

Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. As for prophecies, they will pass away; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will pass away.

For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known.

So now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

WORDS OF REMEMBRANCE

A Guide for Speakers at the Funeral Liturgy

You have been invited to offer *Words of Remembrance* at the Funeral Liturgy for a person dear to you. This is a great honor and responsibility. This guide is offered to help you plan and deliver your remembrance well.

- 1. The spoken remembrance should be no more than 5 minutes in length or 750 words total.
- 2. The Words of Remembrance presentation is not a eulogy. A eulogy tends to tell the whole story of the person's life and accomplishments. Words of Remembrance offer a loving glimpse of the person's life, his or her character traits, and how the person has touched you and the lives of others.
- 3. The following questions may be helpful:

What made your loved one truly happy? What were your loved one's outstanding qualities? What did you learn from this person? How did this person live their faith? What will you remember most about this person?

- 4. There may be some in the congregation who did not know the deceased, but have come in support of the family. Therefore "inside stories" may not be understood. Save such memories for the more personal moments with the family.
- 5. Prepare your remembrance in writing. Writing out the complete text will insure you give a focused presentation, and also stay within the time limitation. Use your own words. Speak from your heart.
- 6. Rehearse your presentation before a friend or family member to check your timing, and to become more familiar with your words. The more you rehearse, the more comfortable you will be at the service.
- 7. Arrive at the church 30 minutes before the service so you can see the podium where you will be speaking, and if you wish, hear your voice on the sound system.
- 8. The priest will introduce you so you will know when to come forward.
- 9. Always read your Words of Remembrance. This will help you to not lose your train of thought.

Thank you for your willingness to share your memories to comfort and encourage those who have come to honor this person's life.
